

The victims of online sexual abuse are right in front of you.


In 2021 an estimated 85 million images and videos of child sexual abuse were reported online worldwide.

And shockingly, Europe has become the epicentre of this issue.

Research shows that an average school classroom of 20 children may have as many as 13 children who have experienced a form of online sexual harm.

Thankfully, a solution to online sexual abuse is right in front of us.

A new law is being considered by the EU that would help stop child sexual abuse.



This law would force companies like Meta, Tik Tok & Google to identify, remove, and report any child sexual abuse material on their platforms.

Crucially, those companies will also be held accountable for failing to protect children from sexual exploitation and abuse.

A recent poll* shows that the majority of Europeans (68%) say they would support the proposed legislation, but we need your help to make this support clear to members of the European Parliament.*







CONVERSATION GUIDE

HOW TO HAVE THE CONVERSATION

Having a conversation with somebody you work with can be tough - but this guide will help to make it as easy as possible for you. Below are five steps to follow when helping spread the word about this campaign:

MAKE SURE YOU'RE COMFORTABLE:

Choosing when, where, and who to have a conversation with can be hard.


We suggest you do it at a time and place that non-work related conversations would typically be appropriate.


If it doesn't feel safe, trust your gut and save the conversation for another day.

LET THEM KNOW ABOUT THE CAMPAIGN:

Let them know that you have come across a campaign recently.

Maybe you saw us on social media, on a podcast, or in the news. Wherever it was, use that as the entry point.







SHARE THE FACTS:

The most important fact you want them to remember is that "Research shows that an average school classroom of 20 children may have as many as 13 children who have experienced a form of online sexual harm".

Get to this early in your conversation after you've let them know about our campaign.

SHARE THE SOLUTION:

The facts alone can be harrowing - so make sure to follow up with the solution.

Letting them know that there is a new law being considered by the EU that would help address this issue will help to motivate them towards action.

ASK IF YOU CAN SEND THEM THE PETITION:

The purpose of this conversation is to spread awareness and drive further action.

So now is the time to let them know about the petition on our website.





DO'S & DON'TS



DO Approach carefully:

Everyone will have a different lived experience with abuse. Stay aware of how you and your colleague are responding to the conversation and exit if necessary.



DON'T Get into an argument:

If you get the sense that the conversation could be heading towards an argument, exit the conversation.



DO Acknowledge any gaps in your knowledge:

You aren't expected to be an expert on this topic - nor do you need to be! If you get asked any tough questions that you don't know the answer to, acknowledge it.



DON'T Dismiss concerns:

The legislation is complex and everyone will have different perspectives. Allow people to ask questions and encourage them to do their own research.

HOW TO SPREAD THE WORD ONLINE


